
BOXWELL'S GATEWAY GETS NEW DESIGN

After some starts and stops the new 100th Anniversary Veterans Gateway at Boxwell Reservation has a new design and construction is underway. Rob Ponder, an architect in Atlanta with deep ties to Boxwell has generously donated the design and will continue to share his talents on future projects.

Rob, the son of well-known Nashville artist Phil Ponder, is no stranger to Boxwell. He was happy to share his story with us. Rob wrote, "I spent my 1st week at summer camp at Parnell in 1971 (site 11- Saskatchewan). I was a two-week camper in the summer of 1973. I was staff at Parnell for the summers of 1974 and 1975. I was in the Handicraft area teaching Leatherwork, Indian Lore, Wood Carving, and Basketry. I continued to come to Boxwell for one-week sessions through college and ended up bringing my troop from Atlanta, Georgia to Boxwell for five summers in the late 80s. Altogether I spent 15 summers being at Boxwell for at least one week!"

Rob received both bachelor's and master's degrees in architecture from Georgia Tech. He was a partner in the first firm he joined out of school but ultimately opened his own architecture practice in 1998. That firm is Ponder & Ponder, Architects out of Norcross, Georgia where he is a partner with his wife (and fellow architect), Carmen.

Rob continued, "My love of Boxwell never diminished. I have attended as many staff reunions as I can... including the one this last fall. After the reunion this last fall I called (Scout Executive) Larry Brown to ask how I might be able to put my 38 years of architectural experience to use for the benefit of Boxwell. I was excited to be able to contribute the design of a signature "Gateway" for the Reservation! My first impulse was to create the design that is now being built... which will be an omage to the Cripple Crab that has been the original "greeting structure" for the last 62 years. I believe there will be a few more opportunities for me to help Boxwell by contributing to the design of the "built environment" around the Reservation. The best part about that is that it will give me plenty of excuses to make "site visits" to a place that I love.

A NOTE FROM THE CAMPAIGN CHAIR

Fellow Scouts, Friends and Volunteers,

Since early 2020, our Council has been operating in the perfect storm, defending itself against a viral health pandemic and legal claims largely not of its own making but for which it may be held financially responsible. This perfect storm has not yet ended. With new miracle vaccines showing signs of reducing the sickness and a Delaware federal judge expected to rule on a settlement



of claims in the coming few days, our Council can and will return to normal operations.

Friends of Scouting supporters have closely followed these events hoping that there will soon be blue skies ahead. Ever optimistic and supportive throughout the last two years, our friends have provided volunteer time and money which has allowed our Council to remain strong, vibrant, and forward thinking. The Middle Tennessee Council, Boy Scouts of America can take pride in its being a leader among the 250 councils serving our nation and has distinguished itself during these difficult times by expanding membership and programs.

As you know from past editions of this newsletter, the Boxwell Capital Campaign was prudently placed on hold more than a year ago because of the uncertain risks associated with the legal issues. Prior to the temporary hold we were fortunate raise \$6.75 million, about 60% of our original campaign goal. We have not finished our job.

The Boxwell campaign will be renewed when we know with certainty the legal path is clear. We have yet to secure funding for the largest and most important of our Boxwell improvement projects, the Aubrey Harwell Leadership Center, which also houses a new kitchen which serves all camps within Boxwell. Upon renewal, our original budget estimate to construct the Harwell Center will increase by 25% or more. The campaign committee is expected to ask for a modification of the original campaign goal to cover added costs, mostly due to increased costs for labor and materials experienced over the last two years. We will have more information about the campaign renewal and its goals in the coming weeks. Be prepared to help deliver this last portion of funding needed to complete the Harwell Leadership Center and to successfully conclude our Boxwell capital campaign.

Let's begin our next 100 years by dedicating ourselves to sustaining and advancing our Council for another 100 years.
