Requirements to Earn the Patch



□ Complete Scouting Safely V2 Training Course

What is it?

An online training course that identifies key resources in Scouting Safely including insurance, incidents that need to be reported, and resources to manage enterprise risks and hazards. **How do I do it?**

Take Riskonnect Training

What is it?

Riskonnect's Incident Reporting emergency portal is a tool that Scouting America uses to handle emergencies and unexpected situations.

How do I do it?

Complete Program Safely Training Courses

What is it?

Online training courses including Climb on Safely, Safety Afloat, Safe Swim Defense, Hazardous Weather Training, Drive Safely, and Range Activities Safety. All must be completed. **How do I do it?**

<u>Teach a "Safety Moment" at a unit event</u>

What is it?

Safety Moments are opportunities to prepare for an activity, review safety measures and report incidents correctly. Topics include incident reporting, safe use of medication in Scouting, weather-related safety, and so on.

How do I do it?

Visit <u>https://www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/safety-moments/</u> to select a Safety Moment to present. (*Note the date, location and description of the event when submitting online.*)

Become a Merit Badge Counselor of a Safety Merit Badge

What is it?

Be approved as a counselor for one (1) of these badges: Emergency Preparedness, Fire Safety, First Aid, Lifesaving, Safety, or Traffic Safety. *(You are not required to teach a badge.)* **How do I do it?**

To become a Merit Badge complete and submit this <u>form</u> to the Middle Tennessee Council. (*Note which of the listed Merit Badges you are a counselor for when submitting online.*)

Recruit a Person to become a Messenger of Safety

How do I do it?

Ask a registered adult leader to commit to become a MoS. (*Submit their name when submitting online. Note: The recruit is not required to earn the patch.*)

□ Earn the Messenger of Safety Patch

<u>Teach Riskonnect Training</u>

How do I do it?

First attend the Riskonnect Training. Next contact Vance Lackey at <u>Vance.Lackey@scouting.org</u> to schedule a teaching session.

Complete Short Term NCAP Training – Cost of \$65.00 per person.

What is it?

District or Council-sponsored events with overnight camping of 1, 2, or 3 nights require a safety assessment. These "short term" events must be reviewed according to National Camp Accreditation Standards (NCAP).

How do I do it?

Contact the Council's NCAP Coordinator Tate Myers at <u>tate.myers@gmail.com</u> to schedule a training session.

Training will be held throughout the year. Please click here for the next available training date.

□ Assess Two (2) or More Activities/Camps/Events

What is it?

Participate in an in-person assessment of two (2) or more events that are either "short term" or "long term" per NCAP standards.

How do I do it?

Contact the Council's NCAP Coordinator Tate Myers at <u>tate.myers@gmail.com</u> to request assignment to an event. (*Note the dates, locations and description of the events when submitting online.*)

□ <u>Attend Three (3) District or Council Safety Committee Meetings</u>

How do I do it?

Contact your district's volunteer leadership or District Executive for the meeting schedule. (Note the dates, locations and description of the meetings when submitting online.)

Recruit Two Additional Persons to become Messengers of Safety

How do I do it?

Ask a registered adult leader to commit to become a MoS. (*Submit his or her names when submitting online*. *Note: The recruit is not required to earn the patch.*)

Complete Two (2) of the Following:

□ <u>Teach a Safety related Scout Merit Badge or a Cub Adventure to Two (2) or more Scouts</u> What is it?

As a registered counselor, teach a safety-related merit badge (see list under MoS patch requirements) to two (2) or more Scouts. *(The Scouts do not have to complete the requirements.)* **How do I do it?**

Contact units or your district's volunteer leadership to schedule a meeting with Scouts. (Submit the Scouts' unit number(s) when submitting online.)

□ <u>Staff a booth or give a presentation promoting safety at a district/council or community event</u> How do I do it?

Contact your district's volunteer leadership or district executive to find an opportunity. (*Note the date, location and description of the event when submitting online.*)

□ Submit an article/video promoting safety to a unit, district, council, school, or a community social media page

Create the content then submit it to a unit, district leadership, council staff or social media platform (It is not required that the article or video be posted, only that it be offered. Include a copy when submitting online.)

<u>Be Certified in One (1) of the Following Trainings:</u>

- CPR & AED
- Wilderness First Aid
- STOP THE BLEED

How do I do it?

Check online for courses and register. (Submit your current certification with the application.)

General Q&A

Can I buy additional patches and knots?

No, not at this time.

Is the knot approved by the National office?

MoS is a pilot program. National has approved the Middle Tennessee Council to pilot the MoS program including earning and wearing the patch and knot.

Is there a device for the knot?

No, but please submit requirement suggestions to Vance Lackey at <u>Vance.Lackey@scouting.org</u>.

Why is the patch and knot mostly yellow and black?

As prominent "safety" colors, yellow and black are a reminder of the wearer's commitment to a culture of safety.

What do the black-on-black letters on the patch mean?

MTC is Middle Tennessee Council and SA is Scouting America. MTC and SA are "ghosted," meaning the thread color of the letters match the background.

When did MoS start?

The program was conceived and developed in the fall of 2024 and had its first public introduction in November 2024. The official rollout was January 1, 2025.

Can Scouts become a MoS?

No. MoS is a pilot program offered only to adults.

Can Scouters outside the Council become a MoS?

No. MoS is a pilot program offered only to adults registered in the Middle Tennessee Council.

Where do I wear the patch?

It is recommended to wear the patch on the right chest, above the pocket. Opposite side of the chest from the Universal Scout patch.

How do I inform the MTC I have completed the patch or knot requirement?

Once the individual has completed the requirements, they will submit the information on a google document that is found on the MoS website.

How do I get the patches?

Patches are available to be picked up at the MTC office.
