





Dear Middle Tennessee Council Scouting Family,

The future of Scouting programs in Middle Tennessee is very bright. The Middle Tennessee Council has been the fastest growing Boy Scout Council in the nation over the last two years (a 3,612 youth increase in this time period). The number of adult volunteer leaders also continues to grow with 6,312 registered leaders serving over 18,600 youth.

The Council's STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) initiatives have been very successful. Over 344 new families have joined Scouting because of the STEM focused programs. These programs still teach the core values of Scouting: Citizenship, Leadership, Character Development and Mental and Physical Fitness.

In 2017, the Middle Tennessee Council conducted a survey with over 1,000 Scouting families. The results were impressive. Over 97% of Scouting families agreed or strongly agreed that "I feel my son's Scouting experience will help him become successful as an adult". As we approach the 100th Anniversary of the Middle Tennessee Council in 2020, it is great to know that families see the value of Scouting programs and want to ensure their children have a positive Scouting experience.







So when it came time for me to decide what I wanted to do for my Eagle project, I knew I wanted to honor Francis and his love of service for others in some way while giving back to my church and community."

One can never be certain of two things in life: who might have an impact on your life, and whose life you might impact. Such was the case for Life Scout Cameron Morgan of Troop 413, sponsored by First Baptist Church of Hendersonville in the Cherokee District. Cameron told his Scout leaders, "This guy came and talked to my school and he was homeless. He said that someone came by one day and handed him some money and gave him a place to stay, and he got back on his feet." This chance encounter moved Cameron in

such a way that he decided to focus his Eagle Scout project to benefit someone that required the same kind of assistance.

Cameron began researching various ideas that could benefit those less fortunate, and learned that transportation was a leading factor hindering many in getting out of the poverty cycle. With further research, Cameron talked with his Eagle Scout advisor and was introduced to a local facility known as Grace Place Ministry, Inc. The idea behind Grace Place is helping homeless women and children get back on their feet by assisting them to transition from temporary to permanent housing. However, one thing often needed to make this work is reliable transportation, which can be a very costly investment for most of these moms.

After reviewing the project with his Scout leaders and working out the details, Cameron set out to secure five donated cars to provide the shelter. Working with dealerships, donors, and Christian Brothers Automotive, a company that has offered their services to certify the

cars road-ready, Cameron has taken on this incredible project. The first ladies to receive their vehicles were simply amazed, and Cameron is well on his way to earning his Eagle Scout rank.

Micah, under the instruction of his grandmother, acted heroically and protected his family and fellow church members in the midst of the chaos when the shooting broke out. Micah, along with his sisters and a few other children, were ushered into a private room by his grandmother for safety. Micah placed a blockade against the main door using a couch and table. He went above and beyond to protect his family by calming and comforting his younger siblings into silence to prevent them from being noticed by the attacker. The Middle Tennessee Council is proud to select Micah Carter as the Cub Scout of the year.



BOY SCOUT OF THE YEAR

Jonathan Cockvell, Boy Scout (Life Scout) of Troop 262

Portraying the spirit of Scouting, Jonathan Cockrell has overcome much in his life to get to where he is today. May 4-6, 2018 Boxwell Reservation





The Middle Tennessee Council has created an incentive for units that meet the 80% of leaders trained threshold. This recognition, known as The Diamond Level Award of Excellence, is available to any unit having at least 80% of their registered leaders complete YPT and their position specific training. Numerous Scout units have reached this goal, and we want to help your group do the same. Those Scouting units that achieve this recognition will receive a special certificate, a Diamond Level streamer, and will be highlighted in Volunteer Hall at the Jet Potter Council Service Center.

URGENT

ALL REGISTERED VOLUNTEERS MUST COMPLETE THE NEW YOUTH PROTECTION TRAINING

BY OCTOBER 1, 2018

Over the past two years, BSA has worked with experts in the field of child abuse to develop new training and resources that will further strengthen our ability to protect youth.

The new version of YPT contains valuable segments on bullying and digital privacy, in addition to addressing tough topics like youth-on-youth incidents.

What does this mean?

- All registered volunteers must complete the new YPT by October 1, 2018 regardless of when you completed the previous version.
- All former versions of YPT will expire on October 1st.
- New leaders are required to take Youth Protection Training prior to completing the registration process.
- There is no longer a different YPT for Venturing. All volunteers take the same training.
- The new Youth Protection training is valid for two years.
- Youth protection training is mandatory for any volunteer who participates in an outing lasting longer than 72 hours. This includes non-registered adults who are helping with summer camp. The 72 hours need not be consecutive.
- Units may not re-charter unless all adult leaders are current with YPT certification. Non-compliant adults will be dropped from the roster.

The only positions exempt from taking Youth Protection Training are:

- Institutional heads
- Adult partners in Tiger and Lion programs

This new YPT takes approximately 1½ hours to complete and includes 4 separate modules which run 20-30 minutes each. The final module is a quiz to test your understanding of policies and reporting methods. 2018 Nashville Patron Luncheon was a Tremendous Success!!!




